Remembering Sisters Annette and Louise

“In the early months of 2007, Marian Hall Home suffered the loss of two of its former administrators, both of whom set a great example for me to follow.

Sister Annette Kuchta, O.S.F. died on April 14th after a long struggle with failing health. She was the first administrator of Marian Hall, serving from 1971 to 1993. A licensed practical nurse, Sister



Annette was justly proud of her ministry here, and will be remembered for many years of dedicated service to our residents and our facility. In her later years, Sister Annette served as Marian Hall’s receptionist, greeting visitors and phone callers with her pleasant voice and a smile.

Sister Mary Louise Vrana, O.S.F. died on January 24th after a brief illness. She was Sister Annette’s successor as administrator of Marian Hall, and led us



admirably for four years. Prior to that time, Sister Louise served a term as Provincial Superior of the then Pittsburgh Province of the School Sisters of St. Francis. She is remembered in particular for her kind demeanor and sense of humor. Before her death, Sister Louise enjoyed having her sister, Helen Mihalik, come to live at Marian Hall, where they enjoyed many visits and sisterly chats.

At Marian Hall, we are saddened by the loss to us of these two women of faith, whose leadership and commitment served our facility so well. But we also know that they will make this next transition with the same grace they evidenced while making so many other transitions on earth. May they rest in peace.

I am also pleased that we will be planting two trees on the grounds in remembrance of Sisters Annette and Louise. As we watch the trees grow, we’ll be able to recall how they watched Marian Hall grow under their leadership.”

Marian Hall Home has been in operation since 1971. We are licensed by the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania and are inspected annually by the Commonwealth’s Department of Public Welfare. We are one of the few Catholic-sponsored Personal Care Homes in the six-county region comprising the Diocese of Pittsburgh.

As a Personal Care Home, our residents must be ambulatory and able to feed themselves. We offer them assistance with daily living in a family atmosphere

that includes many scheduled activities and 24-hour staffing, monitoring of their medication, and respite care.

We currently have more than 60 private furnished rooms (personal furnishings are acceptable) with a call-bell system, the majority of which include private bathrooms. All laundry, linen, and housekeeping services are included.

Our beautiful chapel provides everyone an opportunity for spiritual reflection and growth.

Person-Centered Care at Marian Hall

Sister Marian and Kate Guay received a grant covering expenses to travel to Chicago last October to attend a conference on **person-centered care** sponsored by the National Religious Retirement Office. Person-centered care focuses on creating ‘a culture of aging that is life-affirming, satisfying, humane, and meaningful.’ All these ideas are in perfect harmony with the Marian Hall mission. An environment that respects every person’s life history and preferences, honors their identity, and assures meaningful personalized activities begins with building solid relationships between residents and caregivers.

While at the conference, Kate and Sister Marian participated in rigorous sessions directed toward helping them become good trainers. Over the last few months they have been leading Marian Hall staff members through the techniques they themselves learned in Chicago. This is straightforward – what is not is the understanding that a change in culture is happening whenever fundamental techniques are changing! Caregivers here are asked to “see through the eyes of residents” when they are meeting and helping them. This is not always an easy thing to do, but it is surely **the right thing to do.**
